# THE BUTTERFLY HOUSE AND MINI ZOO



The butterfly house at Williamson Park was once an Edwardian palm house but now houses brilliantly coloured butterfly's and a collection of exotic plants creating a rainforest near the heart of the city. Exploring the building you will come across koi carp, colourful frogs and tortoises. Together with the Mini Zoo and gardens behind and Café, this area is a fascinating place to visit, for all ages. Where Exotic animals can be enjoyed alongside native butterfly's birds and frogs, which are currently spawning in our nature pond behind the meerkats.







The butterfly house itself is a grade II listed building leading to interesting challenges when adapting it to accommodate for multiple species without making structural changes. Kept between 23 and 28 degrees it is the ideal breeding ground for tropical butterflies. Large, camouflaged Owl butterfly's lay eggs on the banana plants and the caterpillars quickly reduce them to stems! Meanwhile a closer look at the citrus plants around the hall will reveal swallowtail pupae and caterpillars. The house holds a variety of species year-round and during the summer months there are a variety of caterpillars to be found.



The minibeast cave is a dark and comfortable home to a variety of invertebrates, reptiles, amphibia and snakes. Highlights include Bruce the royal python the Madagascan Hissing Cockroaches and the newest arrival Tim, a European Eyed Lizard. The adjacent aviary is currently closed for refurbishment and as a safeguard against the risks of avian flu. A group of Java sparrows calls the aviary home and are currently laying eggs just in time for easter!

As you enter the mammal area you will be greeted by Colin and Leo, two Common Marmosets, with a history in the pet trade, living in less than ideal conditions. Whilst viewing the marmosets you may be being carefully watched by one of the seven meerkats, a bachelor group of brothers who are always entertaining to watch as they play, explore and sunbathe. Wilf the rabbit and Jam the Guinea Pig are also lively and will soon be getting a brand new enclosure, with possibly some new friends. The latest addition to the zoo is Nacho, the Prevost Squirrel, a native species of Sumatra, who is rather shy at the moment. Nacho is an exciting addition to the zoo as he will be part of a breeding programme allowing the Park to contribute to global conservation goals, a hard job for small zoos!

The animals in the collection are well looked after by Emma and Milo the zookeepers alongside student volunteers from local colleges and Lancaster university. The zookeeper job is varied and includes a lot of cleaning and feeding alongside projects such as planning and developing new exhibits. The zoo is held to high standards by zoo inspections which are performed annually and is accredited by BIAZA a national association with stringent entry requirements. The zoo takes pride in its education output with school groups and jungle party's resuming after an unfortunate break during Covid-19 as well as a range of exciting educational holiday activities.
